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MSSNY Urges Legislature to Reject Budget Proposals That Will Jeopardize Patient Access to Community-Based Physician Care

Through numerous legislative meetings, MSSNY leader physicians and lobbying staff are highlighting the somewhat positive but also adverse items contained in the Governor's FY 2024-25 Executive Budget that will make it even more difficult for patients to maintain access to community-based physician care. While the public messaging surrounding the Executive Budget has focused on efforts to expand access to care, various Budget proposals would do exactly the opposite, and make it much harder for physicians to remain in practice in New York State to deliver care.

Last week MSSNY President-elect Dr. Jerome Cohen delivered testimony at a joint Senate-Assembly hearing examining these issues. <u>Joint Legislative Budget Hearing 2024 (youtube.com)</u>. His testimony highlighted positive items in the Executive Budget to expand access to care, including investments in the Patient-centered Medical Home program, further medical student loan repayment programs, telehealth payment parity; and expanded health insurance subsidies. However, his testimony urged the Legislature to reject several highly concerning proposals. His testimony urged:

• Oppose CPH Elimination. Opposing a proposal in Part L of the HMH Art. 7 Budget bill to repeal authorization for the MSSNY's Committee for Physicians Health (CPH) program. CPH has for over 40 years provided needed treatment services for thousands of physicians facing behavioral health or addiction issues. Last year, the State Legislature and the Governor agreed to continue this essential program for an additional 5 years. CPH is not funded out of the General Fund but through a \$30 set-aside through the physicians' biennial registration fee that results in an annual appropriation to CPH of \$990,000.

• **Oppose Cuts to Excess Insurance Coverage.** Opposing a proposal in Part K of the Art. 7 HMH Budget bill that would impose thousands to tens of thousands of dollars in new costs on the 15,000 physicians enrolled in the Excess Medical Malpractice Insurance program, by requiring physicians to pay 50% of the coverage cost. This is a nearly \$40 million hit to community-based physicians across the state who already pay among the highest medical

liability insurance costs in the nation. For many downstate surgeons, this cost will be in tens of thousands of dollars!!

• **Protect Physicians' Right to Appeal Claim Underpayments.** Opposing a proposal in Part H of the Art. 7 HMH Budget bill that would repeal the ability of physicians to bring claim disputes with Medicaid Managed Care plans to the Independent Dispute resolution (IDR) process. This change, which would overturn a recent action by DFS to permit the right to appeal these claims through IDR, will lead to steep health insurer payment cuts and network reductions, and discourage many physician specialists from providing essential on-call emergency department care.

 Protect Physician-Led Team Care. Opposing a series of scope expansion proposals in Part Q of the Art. 7 HMH Budget bill to permit Physicians Assistants (PAs) to practice without any physician supervision or collaboration_after 8,000 clinical hours if they practice in primary care or are employed by a hospital; Permitting dentists to perform screening tests for HIV, Hepatitis and Diabetes; and authorizing pharmacists dispensing PrEP on a nonpatient specific prescription basis.

• **Protecting Patient Access to Needed Medications and Treatments.** Opposing proposals in Part I of the Art. 7 HMH Budget bill that would increase prior authorization hassles for Medicaid prescriptions by repealing "prescriber prevails" protections and give power to Medicaid to reimburse physicians for injectable medications at amounts even less than what the physician office paid to acquire the injectable medication.

MSSNY has been working with specialty societies to send joint communications to the entire Legislature raising our collective concerns with these proposals, and the adverse impact on patient access to community-based physician care.

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New York County Medical Society Legislative Forum Focuses on Pressing State Budget <u>Issues</u>

MSSNY lobbying staff participated in a legislative forum last Sunday for physician advocates organized by the New York County Medical Society, New York County Psychiatric Society & the NY Council on Child & Adolescent Psychiatry. Among the presenters were NYS Assembly Health Committee Chair Amy Paulin, Assemblymember Alex Bores and Assemblymember Tony Simone.

Many problematic Executive Budget issues were discussed, including the proposed cost-imposition on physicians for the Excess Medical Malpractice Insurance Program, the proposed elimination of MSSNY's Committee for Physician Health (CPH) program, and the proposal to eliminate currently required physician supervision of care provided by Physician Assistants (PAs) with more than 8,000 hours of clinical practice.

It was suggested by legislators that physicians provide examples of patients experiencing adverse health consequences due to unsupervised care provided by various non-physicians when they had been permitted to do so during the public health emergency. While previous MSSNY surveys have generated such physician anecdotes which have been shared with the Legislature, physicians are urged to again share their stories using this <u>FORM</u>.

MSSNY Organizing Meetings on Capitol Hill to Discuss Impact of Cuts to Physician Medicare Reimbursements on Patient Access

MSSNY lobbying staff is organizing visits for New York physician leaders in Washington, DC, with members of New York's Congressional Delegation on Tuesday, February 13th to discuss how recently imposed steep cuts to Medicare payments is putting Medicare-enrolled patients across New York State in serious jeopardy of losing access to their community-based physicians.

The group will also highlight how unless Congress acts soon, the most recent 3.37% percent cut that went into effect on January 1st, will become permanent. The most recent Continuing Resolution (CR) passed by Congress and President Biden, which keeps the government funded until early March, extended the deadline for the final 2024 appropriations package – our last best hope in reversing these devastating cuts.
