There are numerous adverse measures contained in the Executive Budget that physicians must let their Senators and Assemblymembers know they oppose. These include: imposing tens of thousands of new dollars in new costs on physicians for obtaining Excess Medical Malpractice coverage, repealing authorization for the MSSNY's Committee for Physicians Health (CPH) program; removing supervision requirements for care provided by Physician Assistants; and prohibiting physicians from bringing Medicaid Managed Care claim disputes to Independent Dispute Resolution.

Do not miss this important opportunity for physicians to talk directly to Senators and Assemblymembers about how the Governor's Budget is going to harm patient access to community-based physician care by pushing through the above cuts. MSSNY President-elect Dr. Jerome Cohen Urges Legislature to Reject Proposals That Cut Patient Access to Community-Based Physician Care

This week MSSNY President-elect Dr. Jerome Cohen delivered testimony at a joint Senate-Assembly hearing examining the Health portion of the FY 2024-25 Executive Budget. <u>Joint Legislative</u> <u>Budget Hearing 2024 (youtube.com)</u>.

Dr. Cohen's testimony highlighted several positive items in the Executive Budget to expand access to care, including: investments in the Patient-centered Medical Home program, further medical student loan repayment programs, telehealth payment parity; and expanded health insurance subsidies.

However, his verbal and submitted testimony raised strong objections to other proposals that are counterproductive to maintaining patient access to community-based physician care, including:

- Repealing authorization for the MSSNY's Committee for Physicians Health (CPH) program. CPH has for over 40 years provided needed treatment services for thousands of physicians facing behavioral health or addiction issues. Last year, the State Legislature and the Governor agreed to continue this essential program for an additional 5 years. CPH is not funded out of the General Fund but through a \$30 set-aside through the physicians' biennial registration fee. - Imposing thousands of dollars in new costs on the 15,000 physicians enrolled in the Excess Medical Malpractice Insurance program, by requiring physicians to pay 50% of the coverage cost - a nearly \$40 million hit to community-based physicians across the state who already pay among the highest medical liability insurance costs in the nation. For many downstate physicians, this cost will be in tens of thousands of dollars!! - Permitting Physicians Assistants (PAs) to practice without any physician supervision or collaboration_after 8,000 clinical hours if they practice in primary care or are employed by a hospital. Please send a letter to your legislators urgent them to protect physician-led team care <u>Preserve Physician-led, Team-based Healthcare (p2a.co)</u>
- Repealing the ability of physicians to bring claim disputes with Medicaid Managed Care plans to the Independent Dispute resolution (IDR) process. This change, which would overturn a recent action by DFS to permit the right to appeal these claims through IDR, will lead to steep health insurer payment cuts, and discourage many physician specialties from providing essential on-call emergency department care. - Permitting dentists to perform screening tests for HIV, Hepatitis and Diabetes.
- Authorizing pharmacists dispensing PrEP on a non-patient specific prescription basis
- Extend authority of Nurse Practitioners to practice without physician collaboration.
- Increased prior authorization hassles for Medicaid prescriptions by repealing "prescriber prevails" protections.

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MSSNY has been working with specialty societies to send joint communications to the entire Legislature raising our collective concerns with these proposals, and the adverse impact on patient access to community-based physician care.

Latest Medicaid "Unwind" Data Shows 78% of New Yorkers Renewed Coverage in December 2023

Approximately 78% of New Yorkers who were part of the latest group to undergo screening for the state's Medicaid program, Child Health Plus and Essential Plan, renewed their coverage in December 2023, according to the New York State Department of Health (DOH). This brings the total number of New Yorkers who have renewed coverage since June to nearly three million.

The data is largely consistent with numbers previously recorded with Child Health Plus enrollees continuing to have the highest renewal rates, at 90% for December. By comparison, 79% of Medicaid and 70% of Essential Plan participants renewed.

The New York State Health department will continue reevaluating New Yorkers' public insurance eligibility until all individuals enrolled in these insurance programs go through the process and MSSNY will monitor, and update members as new information becomes available.

Update on MSSNY Veterans Matters CME Programming

The programs provide evidence-based diagnosis and treatment options as well as an exploration of what primary care providers need to know about military culture.

A publication by the RAND corp. found that less than half of private healthcare providers in New York State are familiar percent with military culture or screen for conditions common among veterans. Fewer than 3% meet the total criteria for readiness to meet the healthcare needs of veterans. These programs will assist your physicians in learning how to screen for serious conditions.
